On January 9, 2013, the Idaho State Tax Commission (Commission) issued a Notice of Deficiency Determination (NODD) to [Redacted] (taxpayers) proposing tax and interest for taxable year 2010 in the total amount of \$291.19.

The sole issue for this decision is whether the taxpayers are entitled to a dependency exemption deduction for [Redacted] son from a previous marriage, [Redacted]. As part of their appeal, the taxpayers provided a copy of an Order of Child Support issued by the Superior Court of [Redacted] in May 2010. The Income Tax Exemption section of the document states that [Redacted] shall claim the dependency exemption for [Redacted] for taxable year 2010, and each year thereafter. The document also states the parents shall sign the federal income tax dependency exemption waiver.

The taxpayers did not respond to a letter outlining their alternatives for redetermining a protested NODD, nor did they request a hearing. The Commission, having reviewed the file, hereby issues its decision.

Taxpayers may claim dependency exemption deductions for their dependents as defined in Internal Revenue Code (IRC) § 152. Under IRC § 152(a), the term “dependent” means a qualifying child or qualifying relative. A qualifying child is defined as an individual who (1) bears a certain relationship to the taxpayer, such as the taxpayer’s child, (2) has the same principal place of abode as the taxpayer for more than one-half of the taxable year, (3) meets

certain age requirements, and (4) has not provided over one-half of the individual's own support for the taxable year. IRC § 152(c)(1)-(3).

However, the dependency exemption, as a general rule, is limited under IRC § 152(e)(1) as follows: if the child received over one-half of his support during the calendar year from his parents who live apart at all times during the last 6 months of the calendar year, and the child is in the custody of one or both parents for more than one-half of the calendar year, then the child is treated as the qualifying child of the noncustodial parent if certain requirements are met. The requirements are met if (1) the custodial parent signs a written declaration (in such manner and form as the Secretary may prescribe) that the custodial parent will not claim the child as a dependent for the taxable year; and (2) the noncustodial parent attaches the written declaration to the noncustodial parent's return for the taxable year. IRC § 152(e)(2).

The term "custodial parent" is defined in IRC § 152(e)(4)(A) as the parent having custody for the greater portion of the calendar year. The Order provided does not name the custodial parent but does state more than once, that [Redacted] resides with his father. In addition, in response to a request for information, when asked how many days [Redacted] lived with them during the year, the taxpayers responded, zero. When asked if [Redacted] was the custodial parent, the taxpayers responded, no.

An exception to the above rule is provided in IRC section 152(e)(2) in that if the parent having custody elects to release his claim to exemption for the children in his custody for the year in question, and supplies a written release to that effect, and if the noncustodial parent receiving the right to claim the dependency exemption attaches such waiver to the tax return, then the waiver will be honored and the noncustodial parent may claim the dependency exemption for the child.

The Order provides that the taxpayers are entitled to the dependency exemption for [Redacted]. However, the mere fact that the State court granted the taxpayers the right to claim the dependency exemption deduction is immaterial because a state court cannot determine issues of Federal tax law. Id. See Commissioner v. Tower, 327 U.S. 280 (1946); Kenfield v. United States, 783 F.2d 966 (10th Cir.1986); Nieto v. Commissioner, T.C. Memo.1992-296.

For taxable year 2010, [Redacted] is not the custodial parent of [Redacted] and does not have a signed release from the custodial parent. Therefore, the taxpayers are not entitled to the dependency exemption.

THEREFORE, the Notice of Deficiency Determination dated January 9, 2013, and directed to [Redacted], is AFFIRMED and made final.

IT IS ORDERED that the taxpayers pay the following amount of tax and interest:
