This case arises from a timely protest of a State Tax Commission (Commission) staff's decision adjusting a property tax reduction benefit for 2011. This matter was submitted for a decision based on the documents in the file. The Commission has reviewed the file and makes its decision based on the contents in the file.

All property within the jurisdiction of this state is subject to property tax. A property tax reduction benefit is available to certain qualifying individuals. The benefit is in the form of payment of all or a portion of the applicant's property tax on the dwelling he/she owns and occupies. The payment is funded by state sales tax. The amount of property tax reduction depends on income--the greater the income, the smaller the benefit.

[Redacted] (petitioner) filed an application for a property tax reduction benefit with [Redacted] County. The application was approved, and the petitioner received a benefit for payment of a portion of the property tax on her homestead.

Idaho Code §§ 63-707 and 63-708 provide for an audit of all claims and recovery of benefits that have been paid in error. During the review of the petitioner's application, and records available to the Commission, the staff discovered income that had not been included in the application. The omitted income was from a 1099-C, Cancellation of Debt.

A Notice of Deficiency Determination (NODD) was issued, and the petitioner was asked to repay the benefit received plus interest.

The petitioner protested the deficiency and requested an explanation of what income was omitted from the application. Her file was transferred to the Legal/Tax Policy Division for administrative review.

Income for property tax reduction benefit purposes is defined in Idaho Code § 63-701(5):

(5) "Income" means the sum of federal adjusted gross income as defined in the Internal Revenue Code, as defined in section 63-3004, Idaho Code, and to the extent not already included in federal adjusted gross income:

- (a) Alimony;
- (b) Support money;
- (c) Nontaxable strike benefits;
- (d) The nontaxable amount of any individual retirement account, pension or annuity, (including railroad retirement benefits, all payments received under the federal social security act except the social security death benefit as specified in this subsection, state unemployment insurance laws, and veterans disability pensions and compensation, excluding any return of principal paid by the recipient of an annuity and excluding rollovers as provided in section 402 or 403 of the Internal Revenue Code);
- (e) Nontaxable interest received from the federal government or any of its instrumentalities or a state government or any of its instrumentalities;
- (f) Worker's compensation; and
- (g) The gross amount of loss of earnings insurance.

It does not include gifts from nongovernmental sources or inheritances. To the extent not reimbursed, the cost of medical care as defined in section 213(d) of the Internal Revenue Code, incurred or paid by the claimant and, if married, the claimant's spouse, may be deducted from income. To the extent not reimbursed, personal funeral expenses, including prepaid funeral expenses and premiums on funeral insurance, of the claimant and claimant's spouse only, may be deducted from income up to an annual maximum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) per claim. "Income" does not include veterans disability pensions received by a person described in subsection (1)(e) who is a claimant or a claimant's spouse if the disability pension is received pursuant to a service-connected disability of a degree of forty percent (40%) or more. "Income" does not include dependency and indemnity compensation or death benefits paid to a person described in subsection (1) of this section by the United States department of veterans affairs and arising from a service-connected death or disability. "Income" does not include lump sum death benefits made by the social security administration pursuant to 42 U.S.C. section 402(i). Documentation of medical expenses may be required by the county assessor, board of equalization and state tax commission in such form as the county assessor, board of equalization or state tax commission shall determine. "Income" shall be that received in the calendar year immediately preceding the year in which a claim is filed. Where a claimant and/or the claimant's spouse does not file a federal tax return, the claimant's and/or the

claimant's spouse's federal adjusted gross income, for purposes of this section, shall be an income equivalent to federal adjusted gross income had the claimant and/or the claimant's spouse filed a federal tax return, as determined by the county assessor. The county assessor, board of equalization or state tax commission may require documentation of income in such form as each shall determine, including, but not limited to: copies of federal or state tax returns and any attachments thereto; and income reporting forms such as the W2 and 1099. (Emphasis added.)

Gross income is defined in Internal Revenue Code section 61:

General definition

Except as otherwise provided in this subtitle, gross income means all income from whatever source derived, including (but not limited to) the following items:

- (1) Compensation for services, including fees, commissions, fringe benefits, and similar items;
- (2) Gross income derived from business;
- (3) Gains derived from dealings in property;
- (4) Interest;
- (5) Rents;
- (6) Royalties;
- (7) Dividends;
- (8) Alimony and separate maintenance payments;
- (9) Annuities;
- (10) Income from life insurance and endowment contracts;
- (11) Pensions;
- (12) Income from discharge of indebtedness;**
- (13) Distributive share of partnership gross income;
- (14) Income in respect of a decedent; and
- (15) Income from an interest in an estate or trust.

[Emphasis added.]

The calculation of income for the property tax reduction benefit begins with [Redacted] adjusted gross income. If the claimant is not required to file a [Redacted] income tax return, the starting point for the income calculation is the equivalent of the [Redacted] adjusted gross income, had the claimant filed a [Redacted] return.

In the present matter, the petitioner did not file a [Redacted] income tax return. Therefore, the starting point for the calculation of income would be the equivalent of [Redacted] adjusted gross income.

The petitioner reported social security income in the amount of \$14,952. When the \$31,326 of debt cancellation is added, and medical expenses of \$3,220 are subtracted, the total income for the purposes of the property tax reduction benefit is \$43,058.

The petitioner's 2010 income for the purpose of the property tax reduction benefit exceeds the \$28,000 maximum income allowed for a minimum 2011 property tax reduction benefit. The petitioner must be denied the benefit.

THEREFORE, the Notice of Deficiency Determination dated May 21, 2013, is hereby APPROVED and MADE FINAL.

IT IS ORDERED that the petitioner repays the following 2011 property tax reduction benefit plus interest.
